Xhosa is new name in art

IN spite of the potential, even purely in terms of population, South Africa has never made much headway in developing a purely African school of artists.

The reasons behind the lack are probably complicated, but those who have made an impact have gained substantial reputations; one has only to think of Kumalo, Sithole and Maqhubela and, to a lesser extent, Ben Arnold, Ezrom Legae, Motjuoadi and Ngatane.

Now there is a new name in this limited firmament; it is a complicated enough one, but it may very likely bear watching: Mslaba Zwelidumile Nxgaji, a 22-year-old Xhosa who signs his work "Dumile."

IMPACT

Dumile is being sponsored by Gallery 101, which first discovered his talent as a sculptor and draughtsman about a year ago. It is planning an exhibition for him soon.

Although it will probably not prove the fare to suit Johannes-burg's mostly unadventurous art palate, this show is almost certainly going to have a big impact.

Dumile, a completely untaught artist, is the first African to emerge who captures—with a visionary touch—the essential sadness underlying the life of his people.

Dumile, who has received no formal art training whatever, was discovered by Gallery 101 in Johannesburg about a year ago; it plans to give him his first exhibition soon. In addition to his drawings, this young artist has also revealed a powerful talent for modelling: a group of his terra-cottas is also to be shown. Dumile's appearance is a welcome addition to the restricted ranks of African artists in this country.
